The Folly of Human Wisdom ~Pastor B. Dupre

For the word of the cross is folly to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. For it is written, "I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart." Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, it pleased God through the folly of what we preach to save those who believe. (1 Corinthians 1:18-21 ESV)

I was sitting in a restaurant with some friends several years ago, when the owner/manager, comes over and says to me, "You're a pastor, aren't you? Do you believe in evolution?" "Here we go again; I'm forced into the age old debate", I thought to myself. But I was wrong. This manager wasn't looking to debate me; he was looking for ammunition to use against one of his employees who was openly professing his atheism, his homosexuality, and his total belief in evolution. I responded, "Yes, I believe in

evolution; but not when it comes to the physical bodies of human beings. Caterpillars evolve and become butterflies, but amoebas do not evolve, even over millions of years into human beings.”

I was rather surprised by the manger’s response. He said, “You’re wrong, that’s an example of *change*, not evolution.” It was then that I realized where this guy was coming from. He did not believe in evolution at all. In his opinion, evolution does not exist in any form. And so this belief along with his faith in the Triune God, made this manager and his employee as far apart in ideology as could possibly be. They were total opposites in fact. Now I really don’t like getting involved in this type of debate. You can’t make any headway with either side because both are convinced they are absolutely right. The debater of this age holds to the foolish wisdom of the world. So instead, I simply offered what I see as the difference between change and evolution. Evolution is progressive; it implies forward motion; something becoming greater than it was before. We can say our knowledge, technology and our ability to communicate with one another have evolved, our physical bodies have not. Change can either be progressive or regressive; it refers to motion either forward or backward; change can be for the better or for the worse, such as a change in weather or a change in health. Change we can sometimes make ourselves; evolution happens only by natural process (will of God).

But even this explanation was not soothing to either manager or employee; the manager being convinced faith in God cancels out evolution, and the employee being so lost in his unbelief, rejection of God and sin of homosexuality that even through the folly of what we preach he could not be reached and brought into saving faith by anything I could say or do. They found my words foolish. So I left it at that. The lesson here is that God cannot be known, believed in, or revealed to us through the wisdom of the world. And our own human minds cannot conceive of the wisdom of God. Our own imaginations cannot limit God to only what we can understand or rationalize. We

cannot define God by our weak and flawed human reason. That is why we must trust and rely on the revealed Word of God that comes to us in Christ Jesus, the preaching of Christ crucified, and the Sacraments by which the Holy Spirit comes to us. These are the only true ways to discern between the wisdom of God which is holy and eternal, and the wisdom of man, which is sinful and unreliable.

Three Cheese Artichoke & Spinach Dip

1 package (16 ounces) frozen bread dough dinner rolls, thawed

6 tablespoons butter

1/2 teaspoon garlic powder

1/4 teaspoon crushed red pepper flakes

DIP:

1 tablespoon butter

1 cup chopped fresh mushrooms

2 garlic cloves, minced

1-1/2 cups mayonnaise

1 package (8 ounces) cream cheese, softened

1 cup shredded part-skim mozzarella cheese, divided

1/2 cup plus 2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese, divided

1 can (14 ounces) water-packed artichoke hearts, rinsed, drained and chopped

1 package (10 ounces) frozen chopped spinach, thawed and squeezed dry

1/4 cup chopped sweet red pepper

*Place a 6-in. cake pan or small ovenproof saucepan in the center of a 10-in. cast-iron skillet. Cut each roll into thirds; roll each piece into a

ball. Place along outer edge of skillet. Gently stack remaining balls on top of bottom layer, leaving some space between them. Cover and let rise until almost doubled, about 30 minutes.

* Preheat oven to 400°. Microwave butter, garlic powder and red pepper flakes, covered, until butter is melted. Brush half of butter mixture over dough. Reserve remaining butter mixture.

* Bake until dough balls are set and beginning to brown, 15-18 minutes. Remove cake pan from skillet. Meanwhile, in a small skillet, heat butter over medium-high heat. Add mushrooms; cook and stir until tender, 5-7 minutes. Add garlic; cook 1 minute longer.

* In a large bowl, combine the mayonnaise, cream cheese, 3/4 cup mozzarella cheese and 1/2 cup Parmesan cheese. Add the mushroom mixture, artichokes and spinach.

* Spoon dip into center of skillet; sprinkle with red pepper and remaining 1/4 cup mozzarella. Brush rolls with remaining butter mixture; sprinkle with remaining 2 tablespoons Parmesan. Bake until dip is heated through and rolls are golden brown, 10-15 minutes. If desired, sprinkle with additional red pepper flakes.

Here is what you should know about the virus's symptoms and what you should do if you experience them. In more severe cases, shortness of breath, chest pains, and pneumonia will be apparent."

Remember, that it's important to take precautions to protect not only your health and safety, but also the health and safety of others. Follow CDC guidelines. Stay in your home if you can. If you must go out, wear a mask, don gloves, and stay at least 6 feet away from others. However, note that thrusts of a sneeze with a fan or wind gust, the virus droplets can travel up to 20

feet. Wash hands often for 20 seconds. Clean surfaces with a disinfectant.
