Wounded by the Church

Several years ago, I read an article of the same title as this newsletter. It talked about the many reasons people no longer attend church. Most of the reasons dealt with some deep-rooted physical or emotional hurt caused by someone or something inside of the Christian church. The article went on to say how pervasive this type of thing has become and that more and more people were being "wounded by the church."

At that time, I knew there could be such things going on, but I didn't think it was the epidemic the article made it out to be. That is until I started ministering to the regulars at Beef O Brady's Irish Pub in Lubbock, TX, shortly after having read that article. What I had found there was truly disappointing and supported the assertions I had read about. People were hurt and had deep emotional scars left by someone(s) calling themselves Christians, but not living out that claim. It caused my "mini congregation" to think of the word "Christian" to be synonymous with "hypocrite". During this time I found two different categories in which their pain and suffering fell; abused and neglected.

The abused wounds were caused by Catholic and Protestant church leader's improper sexual advances, misuse of funds, or misuse their authority. And the wounds were deepened when no one took responsibility for those actions, were never held accountable for those actions, or were treated with a "you need to get over it" attitude. Hence the church and the people therein, in the minds of the abused, was no better, no holier, and no different than anyone or anything else.

The neglected wounds were caused by a bureaucratic, cold, callous, impersonal world, which carried over into the Christian congregations. People are desperate to be noticed and cared for. Churches are the one place people look to, sometimes unrealistically, for personal, emotional, and psychological care. They look for compassion, understanding and forgiveness, and very rarely did they receive any of the above. Instead, they received judgment, criticism, gossip and rejection; all delivered with a "holier than thou" attitude.

It was easy to see that my "mini congregation" had been wounded badly by unprofessional, uncaring, hypocrites who took advantage of them and exploited their weaknesses. Unfortunately, I discovered that the article I read was right and maybe understated as well. So, what now? Understanding that there is a problem is important, but what is the next step? How do we treat the wounds that have cut so many so deeply?

The answer is to give the victims what they came to the church to receive in the first place; kindness, understanding, compassion, and Christian love and concern for our neighbors. The answer is for us to be the faithful Christian leaders God has called us to be instead of the self-serving, disingenuous, creatures this world has allowed us to become. But even after we treat these wounds, some may not return to the church. This is where repentance, confession, and prayer come in. God's house is a house of love

and compassion. EVERYONE is welcome in God's house, regardless of what they look like or where they come from. None of us are any better than anyone else. We as Christian are here to serve God and each other, not ourselves. And we must take our service seriously. Maybe someday when we stop just saying those words and actually commit to them, the wounding will stop. God bless you all!

Simple Beef Short Ribs

Ingredients: new

- 1 pound beef short ribs
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour

- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 1 onion, sliced.
- 1 clove garlic
- 1 (12 fluid ounce) can or bottle stout beer
- 1 cup beef stock

Instructions:

- Season ribs with salt and pepper. Dredge in flour until coated; shake off excess.
- Heat olive oil and butter in a large skillet or Dutch oven over mediumhigh heat. Cook ribs until browned, about 5 minutes per side. Remove ribs and set aside.
- Add onion and garlic to the skillet; cook and stir until onion is tender, about 5 minutes. Return ribs to the skillet. Pour in beer while scraping the browned bits of food off the bottom of the pan. Pour in beef stock.
- Cover and simmer over low heat until ribs are very tender, about 2 hours.

If your ribs are very fatty (which most tend to be), you can let the sauce cool and skim the fat off the top before serving.
