"Reasons to be Thankful, Part 3"

"Make a joyful noise to the Lord, all the earth! Serve the Lord with gladness! Come into his presence with singing! Know that the Lord, he is God! It is he who made us, and we are his, we are his people, and the sheep of his pasture. Enter his gates with thanksgiving, and his courts with praise! Give thanks to him; bless his name! For the Lord is good; his steadfast love endures forever, and his faithfulness to all generations."

Psalm 100 ESV

"Praise the Lord, all nations! Extol him, all peoples! For great is his steadfast love toward us, and the faithfulness of the Lord endures forever. Praise the Lord!" **Psalm 117 ESV**

"Oh give thanks to the Lord, for he is good; for his steadfast love endures forever!" **Psalm 118:1 ESV**

As we enter November, the month we celebrate the Thanksgiving holiday, we remember that God brought the pilgrim settlers through the harsh winter and provided them with harvest and bounty. It is a reminder of His great providence. And those settlers did thank God in prayer for that harvest and bounty. But there is more to thanksgiving than just thanking God for giving us our daily bread. Notice anything in common about the Scriptures above? They all speak to the greater reasons we owe God praise and thanksgiving. They all speak to the character of God and who He is. They all say give thanks to the Lord for He is good. That is a characteristic of God. It is who He is. He's all that is good and right and pure and true and holy. In other words, He means you no harm, but wishes everything that is good and right and pure and true and holy for all of His people and even for those who do not know Him; and even for those who reject Him. This is His way of trying to draw the lost back to Him.

These same scriptures tell us that God loves us. He proved it by sacrificing His beloved Son, our Lord, Jesus Christ by death on a cross; crucified for the sins of the world. Jesus willingly laid down His life so that we would not have to face the Father's righteous wrath. He did this out of a love, grace and mercy that we cannot understand so that we would not die but have everlasting life. He died so that we would live. Greater love has no one that he lay down his life for another. And if God loves us, and if He is

for us, who can be against us? You see, Whitney Houston was wrong; the greatest love of all is not learning to love yourself; it's learning of the love that God has for you and I.

These same Scriptures also tell us what kind of love God has for us. It is steadfast meaning It is immovable, certain, unchanging, established, dependable and unwavering. They tell us that His love and faithfulness endure forever—meaning they have no end; faithfulness meaning devoted, loyal, true to one's word and promises. And that means that God will never leave us nor forsake us; we may turn our backs Him, but He will never turn His back on us. If we are going to give thanks to God, let us thank Him for being the loving, faithful, gracious, steadfast, merciful God that He has been, is, and always will be to His people. I think you will agree with me that these reasons to be thankful are far greater than the turkey, mashed potatoes and pumpkin pie that are sure to be a part of the holiday celebration. And yet, we thank God for those as well. Happy Thanksgiving! God bless you all! - Pastor Dupre

Easy Stuffed Peppers

Ingredients

- 6 bell peppers
- \Box \Box ¹/₂ pound lean ground beef
- □ □1⁄2 pound Italian sausage
- 🗖 🗆 1 small onion diced
- \Box \Box 1 can small, diced tomatoes 14 ½ ounces, with juice
- \Box \Box ¹/₂ cup white rice uncooked
- 🗖 🗆 1 ¼ cups water
- 🗖 🗆 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
- D¹/₂ teaspoon <u>Italian seasoning</u>
- □ □salt & pepper to taste
- \Box \Box ¹/₂ cup mozzarella or cheddar cheese shredded, optional

Directions

1. Preheat the oven to 350°F. Grease a 9×13 baking dish.

2. Cut off the tops of the bell peppers, reserving them for the sauce. Remove and discard the seeds and membranes inside the peppers. Finely chop the tops and set aside for the sauce.

3. Bring a large pot of water to a boil and cook the peppers for 5 minutes. Alternatively, air fry the peppers at 400°F for 5 minutes. Remove and drain well if simmering.

4. Heat a large skillet, over medium-high heat. Add lean ground beef, Italian sausage, diced onion, and minced garlic. Brown over mediumhigh heat, breaking up with a spoon, until no pink remains. Drainy any fat.

5. Add diced tomatoes with juice, rice, water, diced pepper tops, Worcestershire sauce, and Italian seasoning. Season with salt and pepper.

6. Bring the mixture to a boil, reduce the heat to a low simmer, and cover. Cook for 15 to 20 minutes or until rice is tender, adding more water if needed. Remove from the heat and stir in ½ cup marinara sauce.

7. Place 1 ¹/₂ cups of marinara sauce in the bottom of the prepared pan. Add the peppers cut-side-up, and divide the rice mixture evenly over the peppers. Spoon the remaining marinara sauce over top.

8. Cover with foil and bake for 35 minutes.

9. Remove the foil and spoon the sauce from the bottom of the dish over the peppers. Top with cheese and bake uncovered for an additional 10 minutes or until cheese is melted and peppers are tender.

Notes

If you want firmer/tender-crisp peppers, skip the boiling step and bake as directed. Peppers can be pre-cooked by simmering, air frying, or baked for 15 minutes at 400°F.

Additional vegetables, such as diced zucchini or chopped mushrooms, can be added to the filling.

Stuffed peppers can be kept covered in the fridge for up to 3 days. Reheat in the oven until heated through.

God Lives Under the Bed

I envy Kevin. My brother Kevin thinks God lives under his bed. At least that's what I heard him say one night. He was praying out loud in his dark bedroom, and I stopped to listen, "Are you there God?" he said. "Where are you? Oh, I see. Under the bed..."

I giggled softly and tiptoed off to my own room. Kevin's unique perspectives are often a source of amusement. But that night something else lingered long after the humor. I realized for the first time the very different world Kevin lives in.

He was born thirty years ago, mentally disabled as a result of difficulties during labor. Apart from his size (he's 6'2"), there are few ways in which he is an adult. He reasons and communicates with the capabilities of a seven year old, and he always will. He will probably always believe that God lives under his bed, that Santa Clause is the one who fills the space under our tree every Christmas, and that airplanes stay up in the sky because angels carry them.

I remember wondering if Kevin realizes he is different. Is he ever dissatisfied with his monotonous life? Up before dawn each day and off to work at a workshop for the disabled. Home to walk our cocker spaniel, return to eat his favorite macaroni-and-cheese for dinner, and later to bed. The only variation in the entire scheme is laundry, when he hovers excitedly over the washing machine like a mother with her newborn child.

He does not seem dissatisfied. He lopes out to the bus every morning at 7:05, eager for a day of simple work. He wrings his hands excitedly while the water boils on the stove before dinner, and he stays up late twice a week to gather our dirty laundry for his next day's laundry chores.

And Saturdays – oh, the bliss of Saturdays! That's the day my Dad takes Kevin to the airport to have a soft drink, watch the planes land, and loudly speculate on the destination of each passenger inside. "That one's goin' to Chi-car-go!" Kevin shouts as he claps his hands.

His anticipation is so great he can hardly sleep on Friday nights. And so goes his world of daily rituals and weekend field trips. He doesn't know what it means to be discontent. His life is simple. He will never know the entanglements of wealth or power, and he does not care what brand of clothing he wears or what kind of food he eats. His needs have always been met, and he never worries that one day they may not be. His hands are diligent. Kevin is never so happy as when he is working. When he unloads the dishwasher or vacuums the carpet, his heart is completely in it.

He does not shrink from a job when it is begun, and he does not leave a job until it is finished. But when his tasks are done, Kevin knows how to relax. He is not obsessed with his work or the work of others. His heart is pure.

He still believes everyone tells the truth, promises must be kept, and when you are wrong, you apologize instead of argue. Free from pride and unconcerned with appearances, Kevin is not afraid to cry when he is hurt, angry, or sorry. He is always transparent, always sincere. And he trusts God.

Not confined by intellectual reasoning, when he comes to Christ, he comes as a child. Kevin seems to know God – to really be friends with Him in a way that is difficult for an "educated" person to grasp. God seems like his closest companion.

In my moments of doubt and frustrations with my Christianity I envy the security Kevin has in his simple faith. It is then that I am most willing to admit that he has some divine knowledge that rises above my mortal questions. It is then that I realize that perhaps he is not the one with the handicap. I am. My obligations, my fear, my pride, my circumstances – they all become disabilities when I do not trust them to God's care.

Who knows if Kevin comprehends things I can never learn? After all, he has spent his whole life in that kind of innocence, praying after dark, and soaking up the goodness and love of God. And one day, when the mysteries of heaven are opened, and we are all amazed at how close God really is to our hearts, I'll realize that God heard the simple prayers of a boy who believed that God lived under his bed. Kevin won't be surprised at all!
