

That Our Joy May Be Full"

"As the Father has loved me, so have I loved you. Abide in my love. If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and abide in his love. These things I have spoken to you, that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be full."

-John 15:9-11ESV

Advent is here, and Christmas will be here soon as well. This time of year the hearts of Christians are filled with natural joy because we understand the great sacrifice God made for us by sending His beloved Son, Jesus Christ, into the world. We understand that being loved, blessed, highly favored and forgiven by God is better than any gift that can be purchased with the wealth of the world. We understand that as we celebrate the birth of Jesus, we celebrate the birth of our Lord, Savior, and King, who brought salvation and eternal life to us all. If that doesn't bring joy to your heart, then you have no pulse.

But Jesus said, "Abide in my love. If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love... that your joy may be full". What does He mean by this? Merriam Webster defines ABIDE as... to remain stable or fixed in a state... to accept without objection... to endure without yielding. Therefore Jesus is telling us to remain in His love; to remain faithful to Him; to endure all things in His name. and He also tells us how to do this. He said, "If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love." By doing what Jesus has commanded us to do; love the Lord our God with all our heart, mind, and strength and love our neighbor as ourselves; and keep the laws He has written on our hearts; remain faithful to Him through all adversity, not being turned or swayed by false gods, doctrines, gospels or prophets; by doing these things, we will abide in His Love. We will remain in His love and our joy will be full.

Do you understand the impact of what Jesus is telling us here? First, He is telling us that the only way our joy can be full, complete, totally satisfying and comforting is through our faith in and love for Him. Earthly joy is and always will be fleeting at best. But true joy that comes to us through Jesus, in our faith by the power of the Holy Spirit, is eternal. It cannot diminish as long as we endure in faith; and that is what makes it full and complete. That is the natural joy that Christians have in their heart. Sadly, it is a joy that those who remain in unbelief will never know. That natural joy brings to all Christian the comfort that no matter what happens, whether we live or die, we're going to be just fine, because we are in God's loving and protective hands.

Second, Jesus said, "These things I have spoken to you, that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be full." Here, Jesus is telling us that our faithfulness and willing obedience brings joy to Him and that He desires us to dwell in the fullness of joy with Him. He wants our joy to be full and complete and that is why He has given us the

pathway to such joy in this passage from St. John's Gospel. Our relationship with our Lord and Savior in our faith and love is the fullness of joy and Jesus desires us to remain in that relationship, that our joy may be full. Merry Christmas and God bless you all! -Pastor Dupre

Christmas Chicken

Ingredients

- 1.5 kg / 3lb whole chicken
- ½ cup softened butter
- zest of 1 orange
- zest of 1 lemon
- 2 garlic cloves finely minced/crushed

- 1 tbsp sage finely chopped
- 2 tsp thyme leaves
- 1 tsp salt
- ½ tsp pepper
- 2 tbsp olive oil
- salt and pepper to taste
- 2 oranges halved
- 1 onion quartered
- 2 garlic bulbs halved
- 10 sprigs fresh thyme
- 6 sage leaves

Instructions

Place softened butter in a bowl then add the zest of an orange and a lemon, crushed garlic, finely chopped fresh sage and thyme leaves. Season with salt and pepper and mix well.

Allow the chicken to come to room temperature before cooking.

Gently loosen the skin over the breast and drumsticks with your fingers, taking care not to tear the skin.

Spoon the butter under the skin and gently spread over the meat until the butter has been distributed over the chicken.

In a roasting dish, add orange halves, quartered onion, halved garlic bulbs, thyme and sage.

- 1. Place the chicken on top then drizzle with olive oil and season generously with salt and pepper on both sides. Pour wine around the chicken then place in the oven.
- 2. Preheat the oven to 180°C/350°F.
- 3. Allow the chicken to roast for 45-60 minutes, depending on size, until golden brown and cooked through.
- 4. Remove from the oven and allow to rest for at least 10 minutes before carving and serving.
